MINUTES OF THE KANSAS CITY AREA GROTTO SEPTEMBER 2019 BUSINESS MEETING Held Tuesday, September 17th, 2019 – 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. Anita B. Gorman Conservation Discovery Center 4750 Troost Ave, KCM0 64110

The meeting was called to order 6:30 by President Pic Walenta. This month we switched up our usual format during the meeting and enjoyed a mini presentation from the Lavicky boys first, then the business meeting, followed by DJ's presentation.

Mini Presentation: Jackson and Brendan Lavicky, Kid's Expedition at Mammoth Cave

Jackson and Brendan were able to participate in the CRF Kid's Expedition this July, held at the Hamilton Valley Research Center near Mammoth Cave National Park. They spent 3 days and 4 nights, explored 3 caves, and spent over 15 hours total in cave! Some topics they learned about included: how to read cave maps, types of caves, cave vandalism, archaeology, cave minerals and structures, and more. Jackson got to be a trip leader on the 3rd trip. Some things Jackson and Brendan thought were neat included seeing Floyd Collins' former burial vault in Crystal Cave, and archeologic artifacts in Salts Cave. It was great

Primary Presentation: DJ Hall, Lightening Your Load Backpacking Workshop

DJ usually does this presentation as a 2-hour presentation and workshop, so the presentation for our meeting was a bit condensed but still incredibly informative. He gave his contact info and encourages anyone to shoot him a text and he'll share the PowerPoint and price sheet he referenced. DJ has done lots of backpacking! He used to do a lot with his wife. It is one of his many hobbies alongside scuba diving, cave diving, flying, and more; he loves the great outdoors.

Backpacking can go right along with caving; we often find ourselves ridgewalking to search for more caves. What everyone learns on their 1st trip—you need a lot less stuff than you think! Some key things to keep in mind: it's OK to get lost, your body copes with a lot, cheap doesn't feel cheap for long, and there isn't much you can't wash in the stream.

DJ talked about "10 easy ways to die while backpacking" (according to the National Park Service): falling, drowning, heart attack, hypothermia, heat stress, avalanche, flash flood, insects, snakes, and predators. (mosquitos kill 700k people a year! Mostly an issue outside the US with malaria). It's all about mitigating the risks! You can do this with knowledge, experience, and the proper equipment.

So, where to start? When building your pack, be mindful of your base weight: the total weight of your entire gear kit (minus food and such)—the essentials. Most people keep this around 15-20lbs, some hardcore people try for around 10lbs... this is hard to do! DJ brought tons of gear to show as well as pictures; Pic and Becky had their packs to share as well.

What do you NEED? You want to stay safe, dry, and warm. Many essentials/topics were talked about including navigation, a headlamp, a suitable backpack, shelter, sleeping gear, clothing, footwear, first aid, water, food, fire, tools, and extras.

Navigation: maps, compass, and GPS. Maps should be waterproof/resistant, maybe laminate if needed. Compasses should be durable and have a fluid filled housing remember they affected by metal. For a GPS, you can use your phone; there are lots of helpful apps, some being AllTrails, View Ranger, Hiking Project REI, and HikerBot. Personal locator beacons are helpful too, such as a SPOT Find Me device, especially in an emergency.

DJ recommends headlamps be comfortable, >100 lumens, efficient, and have angle pivot. They are super helpful around camp once it's dark.

Backpacks come in 3 main varieties: frameless, internal frame, or external frame. When choosing a pack, consider the weight of the bag itself, weight distribution, shoulder straps, etc. He recommended a pack where all the weight rides on the hips rather than shoulders. Also consider the capacity/volume, durability/material (Cuban fiber is great!), design, comfort. Each bag type has its pros and cons. For example, frameless options often tout high capacity, but are typically one big bag that you end up having to dig through.

Shelter: tarps, tents, hammocks, etc. DJ showed some picture examples, and had his tent set up. His preferred tent is an REI Quarter Dome 2. Typically, it's worth going up in the "person count" for a tent if you want your gear in the tent with you.

Sleeping: bag, pad, and pillow. Don't skimp! You'll spend about 1/3 of your time sleeping. Get a nice pad, you'll be grateful. Pro tip—change your socks before bed! You'll be much warmer. You can also put a handwarmer in the bottom of your bag, the difference is impressive. Consider having a sleeping bag rated for colder temps than you plan to be in. DJ showed a couple sleeping pads, there are different tiers you can get. If he has the opportunity, DJ will even layer multiple sleeping pads for optimum comfort. He also loves having an inflatable pillow.

Footwear: aim for comfort, lightweight, good traction, and **not** waterproof. DJ highly recommends getting custom ortho insoles made for your feet, the expense is worth it for backpacking. He has also noticed lot of people have been moving to trail running shoes rather than bigger hiking boots. Take sock liners (x2) to prevent blisters, and socks (x2). Camp shoes are nice to have, such as flip flops or water shoes.

Clothes: You don't need much. Hiking pants should be durable, nylon. Shirts should be breathable. Running shorts with built in briefs are good, however, hiking in pants is typically easier to avoid things like bugs or poison ivy. Other useful articles of clothing are thermal tights, merino wool t-shirt, a raincoat (Pic uses a poncho that goes over everything including her pack), a buff (multipurpose!), hat, sunglasses. Permethrin is a must—spray all your stuff... it kills ticks! It also lasts on clothes through 5-6 washes. Bill shared you can buy as a concentrate on amazon to fully submerge your clothing, better coverage than a spray.

First aid—be specific and intentional in what you are bringing. Don't just buy a kit form a store and think you're good.

Sustainment: water, food, and fire. Always pack 2 liters of water. DJ likes using a 2L camelback bladder, gives easy access. Alternatively, Smart Water bottles come in liter size, take 2. For refilling along the trail, you may want a squeeze filter, water filter pump, chemical tablets, or to boil water.

Food needs to be high calorie, low sugar. Food is fuel! While backpacking, you likely need 3-4,000 calories a day, 125 calories/oz is a good ratio reference. Best types include nuts, peanut butter, chocolate, olive oil, snack bars, tuna pouches, freeze dried foods (watch out, salty!), pasta/rice sides, or dehydrated foods. Pic does a lot of dehydrated food. Becky likes to have options that don't necessarily require heat, such as tuna or mashed potatoes.

Fire—be aware of regulations (some places don't allow). Be prepared for that scenario. Still have waterproof matches for emergency. For a DIY candle, take a match, wrap it in toilet paper, and dip in wax; this should burn for about 5 minutes. Corn chips and Vaseline cotton balls make great fire starter. A metal match is also great to have.

As far as tools and utensils, it's recommended to have a knife, cook stove/fuel, cook bowl/cup, multitool, eating utensil, and FiberFix. DJ loves his JetBoil, Pic likes her ultralight and compact folding stove. Having a ditty bag for the "extras" is great, something to keep your chargers, toothbrush/paste, sunscreen, lip balm, toilet paper, paper towels, pack towel, vitamins, etc. One extra luxury DJ enjoys is a camp chair, he finds it well worth it. His is very light and compact. Also remember to take breaks while backpacking. DJ suggests taking a 10 minute stop every hour.

DJ has a spreadsheet outlining all the gear he talked about and has documented weights and prices of items. Gear expense adds up over time, but the bare bones essentials can be done relatively affordably. You also never know what gems you can find secondhand. Regardless of what you end up with in your pack, where you are going, or the duration of your trip, remember to follow hiking etiquette, leave no trace.
